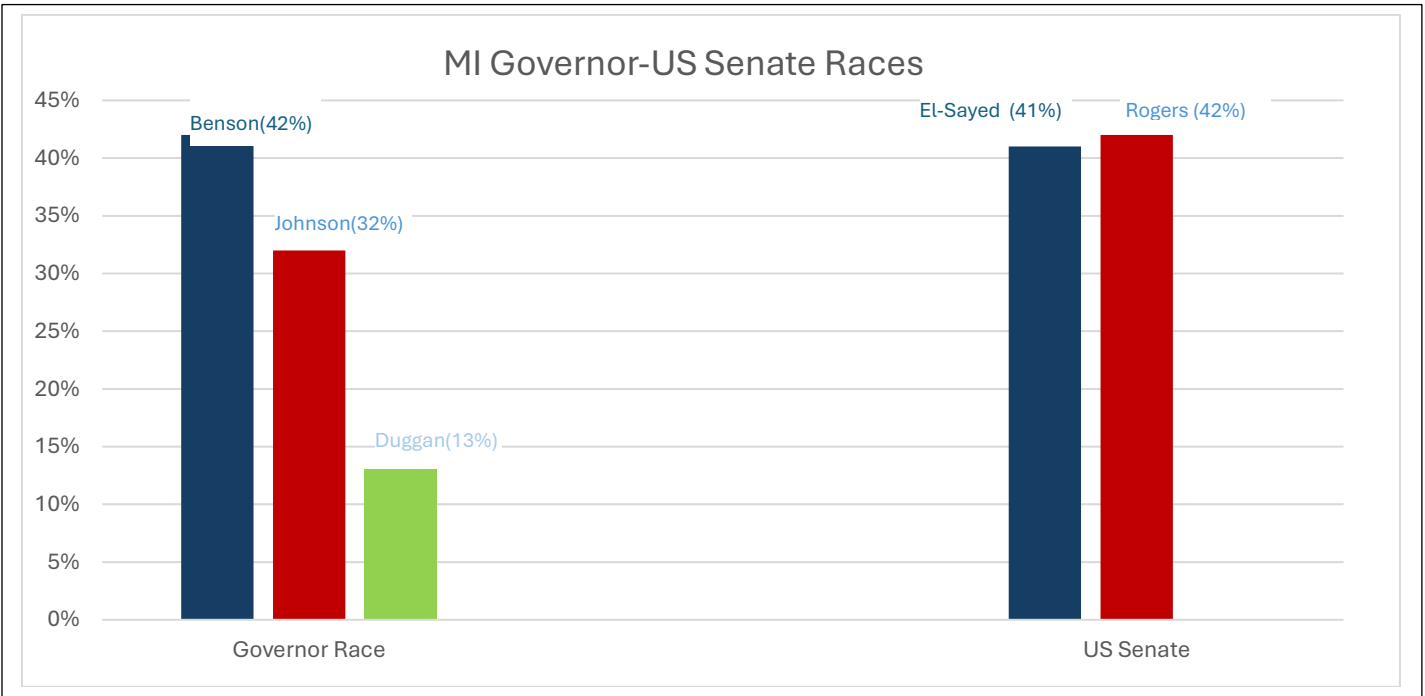

Conducted May 1-7, 2026



Benson Has 10%-12% Lead in Three-Way
Rogers Has 1%-3% Lead Against All Three
(Trump Job Approval at 43%)

LANSING, Mich. — MI Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson holds a 10%-12% lead over all three top GOP candidates for Governor with Independent candidate Mike Duggan getting 13% or 14% of the vote in all three ballot tests. In the United States Senate race, former Congressman Mike Rogers has a 1%-3% lead over Abdul El-Sayed, Mallory McMorrow, and Haley Stevens, according to an exclusive statewide poll of N=607 likely voters in the November General Election for Governor and US Senator conducted for **MIRS** by **Mitchell Research & Communications, Inc.**, May 1-7, 2026. The survey has a margin of error of + or – 6% at the 95% level of confidence.

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In the race for Governor, Benson holds a strong lead over the top three GOP candidates.

All three Republicans are essentially doing the same against Benson. The reason for the small fluctuations can be found in the crosstabs.

- Benson gets 84% of the Democratic vote against Johnson and James, but only 80% of the vote against Cox.
- The reason for less support against Cox is that Duggan takes 13% of the Democrats when pitted against Cox but only gets 10% of the Democratic vote when compared to Johnson and James.
- The reason Benson does better with Johnson than James is because Johnson gets 72% of the Republican vote while James gets only 70%.

These are very minor differences, but they make the difference between whether Benson leads by 10% or 12%. Duggan has clearly lost 3% or 4% since our last survey in November and seems to be less of a force than he was earlier in the campaign. Duggan continues to take more votes away from the Democrats than the Republicans.

- Part of the Republicans' problems is that Benson is stronger with women. She leads 12%-14% among women voters, but she also leads by 3%-4% among men voters.
- As you look at age groupings, the young 18-29 year old voters who were very supportive of Donald Trump in 2024, have abandoned the Republican Party this year.
 - In fact, Benson is getting 77% of the vote against all three Republicans,
 - and the reason Perry Johnson is doing 1% and 2% better against her is that only 12% of the 18-29 year olds are voting for Cox and James while Johnson doubles that and gets 23% of the young voters.

John James had been the strongest Benson opponent in previous polls, so we used John James in a trial ballot question to inform voters that Mike Duggan was a Democrat.

The question was written in the following manner:

"Mike Duggan is a lifelong Democrat who served as Democratic Prosecuting Attorney of Wayne County and worked hard for, and endorsed Barack Obama, Hillary Clinton, Joe Biden, Kamala Harris, and Gretchen Whitmer."

After hearing that information, the race tightened from Benson leading 42%-30% to Benson leading 38%-31%. The big difference is, Benson's support among Democrats dropped from 84% to 77%, and Duggan's support increased from 10% to 17% among Democratic voters. Meanwhile James saw his support increase 1% among Republicans. At that point, Duggan's support grew from 13% to 16%.

As we continued polling, we discovered Mike Cox was doing better against the Democrats than John James was, so for the last 249 samples, we tested Mike Cox against Jocelyn Benson when we informed voters that Mike Duggan was a Democrat. In that scenario, Benson’s support among Democrats dropped from 77% down to 59%. After hearing that information, Cox pulled into a 4% lead (32%-28%).

US Senate

In terms of the US Senate race, El-Sayed is the strongest Democrat getting 41% of the vote.

The reason El-Sayed does slightly better against Rogers than Stevens or McMorrow is that El-Sayed does slightly better with Democratic voters than the two women candidates.

Although El-Sayed is doing well today, it is my belief that El-Sayed will have great difficulty winning the General Election because of how liberal he is on the issues. Michigan is a “purple” state and someone as progressive as El-Sayed may not be able to bring home the victory.

Whitmer Job Approval

- Governor Whitmer continues to have very strong job approval with 52% of voters approving of her job and just 48% disapproving of her job.
- Among the crucial Independent voters, Whitmer has a 56%-44% job approval.

Trump Job Approval

- President Trump’s job approval is 43%, with 56% disapproving.
- Among the crucial Independent voters, Trump has a job approval of 34%.

Trump Iran Job Approval

- The reason for Trump’s problems can be seen in this question - only 40% of voters approve of the job that Trump is doing regarding the Iranian War.
- Trump’s disapproval rating is 58% and almost half (49%) of all voters “strongly disapprove.”

Cost of Living

President Trump ran on the platform of making America more affordable. On the issue of affordability, we asked respondents whether they thought the cost of living has increased or decreased since President Trump took office.

- Two-thirds (67%) of the voters said prices had “increased significantly” (52%) or “increased somewhat” (15%)
- Eighteen percent of the voters said that prices had dropped. Only 13% said they “dropped somewhat,” while another 5% said they “dropped significantly.”
